KEYNOTE PRESENTATION

Cheryl Cobern Browne: Director of Mulranny Arts, and co-host for the Wax Across the Water Retreat



Describing herself as a "Keeper of the Space", Cheryl tells of how many diverse paths have converged to create the place where it is all happening - a small seaside village on the west coast of Ireland. "I always dreamt of finding work in a place like this, I just never thought I would have to be the one to create it myself!" Once a nurse, then a bead shop owner, later a Museum Director, followed by an international tour operator, the path finally led to Essence of Mulranny and Mulranny Arts operating together today. Cheryl shares the challenges and opportunities of leading a creative life while

being able to recognise and respond to serendipitous moments that present themselves at times when you least expect them.

DEMOS & PRESENTATIONS

Isabelle Gaborit: *Time/ surface: an interface*



Isabelle will demonstrate various techniques which can be used by artists working with encaustic painting, focusing on geological activity and phenomena in relation to notions of time. Like the natural forces which give shape to the landscape over a long period of time, she will demonstrate the necessary physicality of the processes that shaped the land, may they be erosion, deposition, weathering, or relief, by building up, scrapping back, heating, cooling, scoring, shaping and building up layers. Overall, by mimicking the addition and subtraction of geological processes in nature, she hopes to reveal records or stories, whose traces are still left on highly tactile surfaces.

Lorraine Glessner: *It Begins with a Mark Lecture*



Whatever we do in the course of making work begins as a mark on a surface. Marks are the building blocks of any work of art and can be achieved through a wide variety of methods and materials. This lecture explores contemporary artists' marks through the categories of line and gesture, process, response, and technology. The innovative concept of the found drawing - drawings that arise as a by-product, rather than any formal process-is also introduced and discussed. Contemporary artists working in the disciplines of painting, printmaking, crafts, fiber, sculpture, and installation are examined in their unique approaches to the mark. Utilizing familiar materials and processes such as smoke, fire, stitch, beeswax, found, and industrial

materials, the marks can serve as both the foundation of content to the content itself. *Workshop: October 11 & 12, 2023. "Mixed Media Encaustic: Line"*

Joanna Kidney: The Mark and the Line with Encaustic Paint



This demo will focus on the potential of drawing within an encaustic painting, covering the possibilities of a wide range of additive and subtractive processes, media and tools (intaglio; encaustic inlay; working with defined edges; compatible drawing media; transfers; flow pen/wax melter batik pen). I will offer suggestions of practices/experiments to nurture improvisation and play and expand visual vocabulary. And cover tips and techniques for working with more control, definition, and precision. Bring curiosity!

Lora Murphy: "Painting with Passion. Easel painting with encaustic"



Join me for a demonstration of encaustic easel painting. Yes, it can be done! I will provide an overview of the materials and techniques used in encaustic painting and will demonstrate how to create an expressive contemporary encaustic painting from start to finish.

During the demonstration, you will learn about the history of encaustic painting and its unique properties, as well as how to mix and apply the encaustic medium to create different effects and textures. You will also have the opportunity to ask questions and get tips from me.

Whether you are a beginner or an experienced artist, this demonstration is a great opportunity to learn more about encaustic painting and see it in action.

Linda Robertson: "Create Powerful Imagery with Stencils"



My "Choose to Rise" series was defined by my use of silhouettes, which required extensive experimentation into how to cut my own stencils. I'm excited to share with you some of what I discovered! I'll demonstrate a few of my favorite methods for creating and using both hand-cut and commercial stencils, as well as some of the interesting stories of how my imagery came to be. Using stencils offers a simple way to develop striking forms in your encaustic paintings, and I hope to get you excited about trying it yourself.

Regina B. Quinn: "Combining Encaustics and Oils for Luminous Results"



Layering encaustics with translucent and opaque oils can result in radiant works—paintings that seem as though they have been lit from within. However, the same combination, when out of balance, can lead to utterly disastrous results! In this demonstration, we'll explore principles for safely blending these media as well as a wide range of techniques for creating luminous images using encaustics, oil paints, and R&F Blending Medium and Pigment Sticks. Demonstration attendees will

receive a link to a set of print materials and video demos by Regina for reference once they are back in their own studios.

Patricia A Russotti: "Artists who use a camera: Photographs, Transfer Film and Encaustic"



Patti will present photographic and photo-transfer encaustic works representative of combinations an artist can use to make images with prints on different substrates followed with wax. She will explain her inspired process of utilizing inkAID brand transfer film and Transfierz Image Transfer Medium to create gorgeously layered encaustic art. Expand your idea of what a digital print can be and the almost limitless range of possibilities of what your individual imagery can become. This is a show-and-tell of the possibilities of working with photography and creating the circle of digital to analog to digital to analog...round and round.

Dietlind Vander Schaaf: "Layers: Translucency & See Throughs"



This demo offers attendees a deeper understanding of how to create paintings that suggest luminosity, optical depth, and dimension while focusing on the connection between mark-making and meaning. Instruction will focus on building paintings from the ground up - covering what can be done directly onto a substrate, between layers of medium, and on the surface - as well as how to create a smooth even surface. The discussion will cover how to control your

fusing to achieve a smooth, even surface and work with various drawing materials such as ink, charcoal, Pan Pastel, oil pastel, pencil, graphite, and Pigment Sticks.

Bettina Sennhauser: "Encaustic Meets Fresco"



The encaustic and Roman fresco techniques use different materials and methods that complement each other. This workshop will focus on building paintings from the ground up, adding beautiful glazes of diluted inks and stains to highlight hidden cracks and fractures. Additional structures, marks, and colors will be created using encaustic paints, pigment sticks and pan pastels."

Mel Williams: "Painting a Rugged Landscape"



My demonstration and presentation will give you an insight into my process of creating an encaustic landscape using a variety of techniques. You will see me using many forms of hot and cold wax tools and unusual mark-making materials to create texture and depth to create the painting. My process has developed over many years of practice and experimentation which now allows me to create

a landscape that captures the rugged and varied elements of our environment. I live in the Eryri National Park in Wales, surrounded by mountains and gnarled trees and this is my inspiration.

Janise Yntema: "Adding Histories: Transforming the Substrate "



Learn how a mixed media approach can enhance the substrate and bring a new dimensionality to your encaustic work. Learn to appreciate the substrate not as a base but as an integral part of the creative journey. With a focus on upcycling and repurposing, this demo will show how materials compatible with encaustic such as recycled cardboard and carton can be used to develop and transform the structural basis of encaustic paintings, pushing the work into new directions. Found objects

will take on new interest as students realize their potential in expanding and extending form and meaning in the work."
